CTE in Colorado

29% of Colorado jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Colorado industries such as:

- advanced manufacturing
- energy and natural resources
- health and wellness
- financial services



In 2023, 96% of Colorado high school CTE concentrators and completers pursued postsecondary education, joined the military or the Peace Corps, or entered the workforce immediately after graduation.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Colorado, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, Colorado had:


