CTAE in Georgia

31% of Georgia jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career, technical and agricultural education (CTAE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Georgia industries such as:

- arts
- agribusiness
- energy
- logistics and supply chain



Across Georgia, 27,594 students and more than 13,000 employers participated in work-based learning in 2022-23.

Many students are already enrolled in CTAE in Georgia, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, Georgia had:


