

CTE in Idaho



38% of Idaho jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Idaho industries such as:

- aerospace
- food production
- tourism
- energy



In 2023, there was a 42% increase in the number of Workforce Readiness and Career and Technical Education Diplomas issued to Idaho students.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Idaho, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, Idaho had:

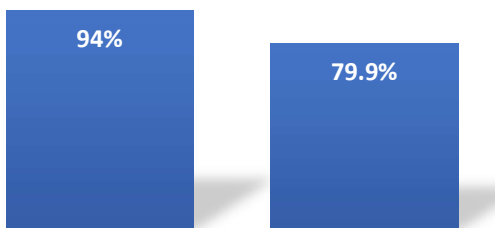
