- outdoor recreation
- construction
- healthcare
- advanced manufacturing









In 2023, 66% of New Hampshire high school CTE concentrators graduated having participated in work-based learning.

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Many students are already enrolled in CTE in New Hampshire, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, New Hampshire had:


