CTE in Ohio

32% of Ohio jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Ohio industries such as:



- financial services
- military and federal
- automotive
- gene therapy









In 2024, 39% of career and technical education students earned one or more of Ohio's indemand, industry-recognized credentials.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Ohio, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. Ohio had:


